### FWIN Women Have Their Say at 'Countdown to Brexit' Event



Foyle Women's Information Network were delighted to welcome MEP's Martina Anderson and Naomi Long to The Guildhall in association with Derry City and Strabane District Council Culture Night celebrations on 20<sup>th</sup> September 2019. Joining the MEP's were Professor Colin Harvey of the School of Law at Queen's University Belfast, as well as the broadcaster and Holywell Brexit expert, Paul Gosling.

Fresh off the plane from Brussels, both Martina and Naomi shed light on some of the more practical issues that the north-west may face in the near future - from cross-border shopping to citizenship concerns.

With the final portion of our morning devoted to Q&A from the audience, MEP's were asked about the future of the women's sector, EU funding and what we in our communities can do while waiting for clarity to be gained.

All of our panelists replied with the same suggestion – for women to make their voices heard, to have conversations, and to decide how they want their future to progress.

### **Annual Networking Event Success**

Foyle Women's Information Network hosted its' annual Networking Event in St Augustine's Hall on Thursday 12 September encouraging women from both sides of the community to come together to gather information about local organisations.

The event helps raise awareness of services available to women in our community and offers an opportunity for them to find out about a range of events, support, advice, volunteer work and training open to them in the North West and throughout the Region.

Building on from last year's numbers an increase to 111 women attended the day. Feedback as always was invaluable and sent a clear message that events



such as these are invaluable, necessary and very beneficial. It was noted that a diverse and wide range of services was on display and that this was one of few opportunities to meet people and hear about projects across the City.

In conjunction to our regular attendees the day also welcomed women who were new to FWIN. The integration of the different service users; those familiar with and those new to our events; those from different sides of the community; those from rural and city areas and those from varying age groups was a huge achievement in itself. The biggest triumph however, was in how these women effortlessly interacted with each other, each hoping to discover and meet their own individual needs and collectively striving to reach out and connect with others.



An impressive 30 organisations took part in displaying stands and taking time to speak with individuals sharing information and offering a variety of opportunities. Each reported that the event proved to be very successful in that they got to speak directly with many members of the public, but it was also excellent in allowing them to network and build contacts with other businesses.

The success of the event was rounded off with a luxurious finger buffet arranged by FWIN and provided by Café Zest. This again afforded women more time to mix and learn about each other. FWIN staff would like to say a huge thank you to St Augustine's Hall for allowing us host our event and to Café Zest for the catering, the organisations who displayed stands and to all the women who took time out for themselves

to explore what is available to them and where they can access it.


A final thanks to members of our committee who came and whose help on the day was invaluable.

FWIN were delighted to welcome Marylouise Oates to Holywell DCCP on 19<sup>th</sup> September for an inspirational women's event.

Marylouise is the author of three novels: one of them, *Making Peace*, which describes the turmoil and intrigues of the anti-war movement, was praised in the New York Times for capturing the sprit of those times.

She worked with First Lady Hillary Clinton in the global initiative to empower women, Vital Voices, and created and directed the Friends of the Communities of Northern Ireland, which has raised and allocated more than 5-million pounds to community-building and peace-building projects.

The event allowed our women the opportunity to gain an insight into the highest office of power in the world and together with her son Michael, Marylouise also told

us about her own grandmother who hailed from none other than Orchard Street in Derry-Londonderry. We all agreed that meeting Marylouise and hearing her stories of women in power was hugely inspirational – it was a wonderful way to spend a morning.



The Stories We Tell: Re-imagining Human Relations by Cathy Higgins is an exploration and critique of patriarchy through the medium of story. Patriarchy is an unjust and undemocratic social system that has institutionalised gender inequalities and justified the use of dominating power to protect the privileged. This book is concerned to illustrate how patriarchy continues to shape cultural traditions and human relations in Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and further afield, impacting all areas of life. It juxtaposes personal life-stories shared by women and men living in Derry/Londonderry, Strabane and Inishowen with critical reflections on literary works, including biblical texts, to illustrate the damage wrought by patriarchy. Egalitarian practices and proposals from this northwest region on strategies to dismantle patriarchy are outlined.

### Day of Action opposing Welfare Cuts and Austerity

A Day of Action calling for Welfare Reforms to be scrapped and an end to cuts will be held in Derry on Saturday 5th October at 3pm, Guildhall. The call was made by campaigners attending the September 5 Derry and Strabane Council hosted meeting in the Guildhall Main Hall on 'Undoing the damage of Welfare Reforms' that heard from advice workers, community activists, trade unionists, food bank workers and many others.

The meeting followed from a motion passed earlier this summer committing the Council to working to address the impact of welfare reforms in Derry. Speakers representing the NIHE, the Derry Trades Union Council, Strabane Food Bank and Advice North West described welfare reforms as having had a 'disastrous' impact on the Council area. If mitigations are allowed to expire at the end of March next year the damage will mushroom. This will also be the case if the full roll-out of Universal Credit is allowed to commence.



The Day of Action is backed by the Derry Trades Union Council, Action Against Cuts, the Civil Rights for the 21st Century Committee, UNISON Community Branch, women's rights organisations and others.


